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### Reprint from 1934 Editorial

*"One of the "Creekers" has very wisely raised the question as to what will happen if visitors to the creek continue to pick the wild flowers and shrubbery...unless the practice is discouraged, there will soon be a serious lack of wild flowers on the creek. Let us therefore strive to preserve the wild flowers and do all in our power to preserve and encourage their growth and thus further the beauty of the creek."*

Morgan said the same in Heidi Winzinger's documentary; we do need to replenish some natural flora, as there was indeed some over-picking.

If anyone would like to undertake the research to find out what flowers adorned our banks, please let Teri or Sharon know and we will share your findings with the community.

## The Ornithologist Corner



Prior editions of our newsletter had information concerning natives to our area. A common bird along our banks is the beautiful cardinal. A study conducted in 2016 in Atlanta, Georgia on West Nile virus (WNV) transmission in the United States, found that unlike other species, cardinals biologically suppress the disease upon infection.

Cardinals eat mostly seeds, insects, and berries though their diet is quite varied. They will feed on many insects, including beetles, true bugs, grasshoppers, caterpillars, ants, flies, and many others, also spiders, centipedes, and snails. Most of diet is vegetable matter, including seeds of weeds and grasses, waste grain, leaf buds, flowers, and many berries and wild fruits. Young are fed mostly insects. The male cardinal sings to defend nesting territory, actively attacking intruding males (and attacking his own reflection in windows and mirrors). In courtship, male and female raise heads high, sway back and forth while singing softly; a male cardinal often feeds the female early in breeding season. The female cardinal sings mainly in spring before start of nesting. A

nest, built by the female, is usually well hidden in dense shrubs, vines, or low trees, placed 3-10' above ground, sometimes higher. Nests are open cups made of twigs, weeds, grass, bark strips, leaves, rootlets, lined with fine grass or hair.

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
